

An Epistle from the ENRIGHTS

Dear Friends,

As we start this new year we are excited about the possibilities that are before us. We pray that God will continue to guide and direct us through this year that we may stay in the center of His will doing the work He has assigned to us. Our prayer for you is the same. May you walk with God through this year and experience His leading and blessings in your life. As always, **thank you** so much for making what we do here in Africa possible. We are humbled and grateful as we see God calling people in America to support us and partner with us.

As we look at the year ahead, we are already gearing up for the two sessions of **Kafakumba Pastors' School**. The session in May/June will be bigger than usual as we anticipate some of the graduating students from Congo coming to join with the graduating class from Zambia and Tanzania. Then the second session for the Congolese students will be in August/September. The construction work at **Kafakumba Training Center** continues to make slow but steady progress. With the extra students coming from Congo we are under pressure to get the new fifth dorm finished, but we work best under pressure! Since some of the construction has been completed we are able to start hosting more outside groups again. This week the Pentecostal Assemblies of God group is here, and next week we are hosting a conference for a group from Europe called Anamed. This conference is to train health workers about natural medicine and the use of different plants that are available locally. (Obviously one of the plants available here is **aloe vera!**)

There is also progress in the different projects that we are involved in to create money to sustain the work at Kafakumba Training Center as well as schools and other important projects. Sometimes it seems like one step forward, two steps back, but slowly progress is being made. The **beehives** are being built, placed in the forest, inhabited by bee colonies, and producing honey. We now work with 1200 Zambian beekeepers. The **aloe vera** is becoming very well known in this area and is used by people with all kinds of medical conditions. Thirty-five acres of **fish ponds** were dug during dry season and are systematically being filled and stocked. The **bananas** continue to produce fruit. The **cows** continue to grow, and we were able to provide 2 animals for the Luanshya Aids Orphans feeding program over the Christmas holiday. It all has its challenges, but is exciting.
