Dear Friends,

Greetings from wintry Zambia where the temperatures drop to below 50 on a cold morning! (Remember - no central heating.) Our new fireplace is being put to the test with the chilly weather. We are healthy and doing well.

We have realized that we get so involved with the many programs and projects here that we forget sometimes to share with you what is happening in the different areas.

We would like to give you a brief report of the different areas that we are involved in.

Pastors' School May/June 2010

There were about 80 pastors studying at this session, mostly from Zambia and Tanzania. The pastors are always so appreciative of the time they have here to study and are eager to learn. They continue to stress how much of an impact the school has on their wives when they come. The children had a ball this year with trampolines, toys, desks, and supplies that arrived in a container just before school began! We had only 2 visiting American teachers this year.

Pastors' School August/Sept 2010:

We hope to have the Congolese students come to Zambia for a one-month session about the middle of August. This will be the first time they will bring their wives with them to Zambia. It will be exciting for them also to have some visiting American teachers as well during this session.

Construction:

Dormitories, dining hall, guest cottages, offices - all are under construction at varying stages. Sometimes it seems that we will never be finished with the construction! Major landscaping is also being done with terracing being put in, trees and grass planted, and an irrigation system installed. We have been given a grant to help with finishing the construction of the Kafakumba Training Center which has been a real answer to prayer and blessing.

Projects:

The agricultural projects that we are working with continue to make progress. Brian and Jade are working with the bananas. We are trying a new species to see if we can avoid the virus that has caused so many problems for us. The aloe vera struggled with all of the rain last season, but is thriving now. The amount being sold has risen dramatically the last few months as we get more plants producing. The beekeeping project is really growing. This year we have 3500 beehives in the fields. There are two honey harvests a year here in Zambia, and the most recent one produced about 5 tons of honey. Nathan is continuing to dig new ponds for the fish farming project. He also has set up a hatchery here and is supplying the fish to stock his own ponds as well as nearly all of the fish farming projects in Zambia. The woodworking projects have slowed down a bit. The big orders from the mines have stopped coming in so we are looking to other areas for orders.

Finances:

We have been so thankful for the financial support that has continued to come in for our salary and for the projects that we are involved with. At this point we have less than 2 years before John will be 62 and we can begin to get our pension from the mission board of the United Methodist Church. God has continued to bless us with the support needed so we can carry on the work He has given us here in central Africa. We are so grateful.

Pastors' School, seminars and training sessions, agriculture, and construction - there is always a lot of activity. Thank you for helping us to continue to work here and experience all these things. We wish you could come and be a part of these activities with us so that you could see how **God is blessing and building His Kingdom. Thank you.**
